





ROSLYN LINDSAY keeps vigil by her husband Reg's, bedside, holding his hands and talking to him out loud. "I'm convinced he can hear me", she said. But Reg lies, motionless, eyes closed, lost in a coma that's kept him locked away from this world since late January.

"Occasionally someone will come into the room", Ros continued, "and Reg will open his eyes and carry on a short conversation. Then the visitor will leave, and Reg goes back into a

deep sleep."

Reg Lindsay, who will be 63 in July, was in Tamworth for the annual Country Music Festival. Thousands were in town to see him perform and be awarded for his contribution to country music. With a career spanning over 40 years and close to 70 albums, Reg knows about awards.

Dreaming of being a stockman, Reg became a proficient shearer, fencer and station hand. He accepted a job on a station outside Broken Hill, but it was then fate stepped in.

He was injured riding in a rodeo, and while recuperating in hospital, became a radio dial twister looking for his favorite music. He found it coming out of a Sydney radio station's talent quest.

He entered that quest, and won. His dream of riding the range turned into fulfilling his love of music, passionately.

"Sometimes," Ros continued as-she watched Reg's face for a response, "his passion for what he does turns angry. He gets frustrated and that's seen by others as aggression.

"What it is is Rea's devotion, honesty and integrity being questioned and he doesn't like that. In fact, he had an argument with someone the night before he collapsed. It cleared the air, but I don't know what effect it had on him."

But Ros is far from blaming anyone for her husband's traumatic experience.

"I've done some research on what causes an aneurysm. It can strike anyone, any age, of both sexes, any time ... without warning. And that's what happened to Reg. He went into the bathroom of a cabin we were staying in with my mum and dad just outside Tamworth, and he didn't come out. That was January 25th. I've been with him since then — it's where I belong."

There was hope Reg could undergo surgery not long after his brain exploded. But things went wrong. His lung collapsed, and his condition went from stable to worse and back again. Doctors hoped they could operate mid-February, but the risk was far too high.

Now that surgery has been performed and the pressure on his brain relieved, Ros and the

doctors wait.

"I pray a lot," said Ros. "I've watched the man I married seven years ago stopped in his tracks. We love life ... and each other. His muscle tone has gone, his face is pasty and his eyes look at me, then look at something else in the room. I smile and talk to him."

Ros has kept busy, working on a major country music festival for the Cessnock show-

grounds.

"We started work on it last year ... Reg would want me to go on with it. I had to cancel 25 shows Reg was meant to have done after Tamworth ... he'd be cranky about that!" she said with a chuckle, "but for now I walk around like I'm jet-lagged.

"We will be together again ... there is no other conclusion, no other acceptable choice."

And the beeping of machinery and quiet murmurs of white-gowned staff fills the intensive care ward.
